

This month's story is from Betty Johnston. Betty writes:

God is good and life is precious! I was born in Bastrop, Texas, the oldest of three children. I was raised in Uvalde, Tx, graduated from Uvalde High School with a scholarship to Southwest Texas State. I worked at the college infirmary where I met and married my future Life's Partner, L. T. Johnston.

In 1960 we moved to Austin so he could finish school at U.T. Our three children, Loren, Sean and Debbie, were born in Austin. After L.T.'s graduation we moved to Bastrop, La., then La Marque, Tx and Kingsville, Tx with Celanese Chemical Co. I enrolled at A & I needing six hours to graduate when we were transferred to Easton, PA. I finished my degree at East Stroudsburg State College and received my degree in absentia from A & I. After 2 years we were back home, Pampa, Texas. We lived there for 22 years. I began teaching Homemaking at Pampa Middle School, then at Pampa High School. In 1990 I was diagnosed with MG (a neuro-muscular disease). I had a thymectomy in Houston which put me into remission.

Our family enjoyed camping in Colorado and partaking in Winter Sports in Angel Fire, NM. My husband was diagnosed with a "blood disorder" and given 4 years to live. God blessed us with 19 active ones instead. In 1993 we designed and built our retirement home in Angel Fire. In 1995 he passed away with Leukemia at the age of 55 shortly after our 35th Anniversary.

I moved to Kerrville to be nearer to my parents and my sister in Uvalde. My parents are now deceased and my sister is living here in Kerrville. Last year I had a fall and was unconscious for two days before being found. I was air lifted to Methodist Hospital in S.A. I was in a coma for nine days and diagnosed with "drug induced delirium" caused from medications. I lost all memory and recognition of family.

I was admitted for therapy back here in Kerrville where I learned to walk and write again. I thank God for life and for my Guardian Angel who has a fulltime job. I now have two grandchildren, Cody and Christina, who live in Amarillo, and a gorgeous three year old great grandson, Lauren.

Thank you, Betty, and welcome to Kerrville.

Saturday evening, February 11th, the Trinity deacons hosted a dinner for the widows over age 55 who were in their groups. It was a very nice affair. The tables were decorated in a Valentine theme of red and white. A nice meal was served to the guests by their host deacon and his wife. The meal was followed by a program featuring Ray and Jan Solomon. My deacon and his wife gifted

me with a gorgeous long stem red rose surrounded by greenery and ribbon. I am still enjoying it as I sit down to write this.

Brother John was absent from Wednesday night's prayer meeting, leaving Larry Danks in charge for the evening. Larry opened by saying that he was not the teacher that Brother John was and then he had a special program for us. He gave us the "stories" behind some of our favorite hymns. He ended the evening with a DVD of the life story of Fanny Crosby. She wrote numerous poems that have been turned into hymns and are found all through our hymnals today. She was blind for most of her life. I don't know about you but I love hearing about the stories behind our hymns.

Thursday the 16th was the Prime Time Dinner. The program was another super presentation of a book reviewed by Carolyn Dance. Carolyn is always spell binding in her presentation. She has you in the palm of her hand from the opening sentence until the end. This book was the story of a lady missionary held captive by the Japanese during World War II. The name of the book is "Evidence Not Seen".

Since our last newsletter, we have lost a third member of our Class, Dale Webb. Dale and his wife, Betty, hosted us as well as many youth groups at picnics and other occasions at their lovely place on Johnson Creek. Dale would always have plenty of green sticks of just the right size to cook his famous Biscuits on a Stick. Dale had been a Marine in the Pacific during World War II. He and Betty met at Baylor. After the war they lived in Houston where Dale practiced Law.

In retirement they were members of AIRSTREAM. He and Betty both became officers in the National Airstream Organization. They also coaxed several other of their Jubilee friends to join Airstream and participate with them. Betty, we will miss you as well as Dale. Please keep in touch!

Soothe a Sore Throat

Gargle twice daily with a solution of six pressed garlic cloves mixed into a glass of warm (not hot) water. Follow the regimen for 3 days. Research shows that fresh garlic juice has antimicrobial properties that fight pain-causing bacteria. The warm liquid soothes inflamed tissue.

Soften Chapped Lips

Rub on anti-inflammatory, antioxidant, and moisturizing olive oil two or three times a day to soothe, soften, and lubricate. Your lips will feel immediately better, but it will take a few days before they start to heal .


Hello from the Library Ladies!

Little Known Facts About Texas

During the Texas Revolution, men from across the entire globe trekked to Texas to offer their support for the cause. Prospero Bernardi was one of those brave men, traveling from his home country of Italy to join the fight for Texas.

Born in 1794, Prespero Bernardi was a notary by trade. Arriving in Texas on a ship named the Pennsylvania, Bernardi soon became a member of Captain Amasa Turner's volunteer company, which was raised in New Orleans. On February 13, 1836 he enlisted in the Texas Army and several months thereafter distinguished himself in the battle of San Jacinto. He remained in the army until January or February 1837, when he was medically discharged at Galveston because of a spinal injury sustained during combat.

Bernardi received a bounty grant and a first-class headright grant for his military service, but eventually both were assigned to other parties. Bernardi's whereabouts by 1838 are unclear, but in February of that year two former fellow soldiers testified that he was deceased. Today, a bust of the soldier stands in front of the Hall of State at Fair Park in Dallas to commemorate the contributions of this little-known Italian immigrant to the Texas Revolution.

Genesis 1 - Mark Ross



The Genesis 1 hiking trip for March will feature 1,644 acre **Enchanted Rock State Park** located 17 miles north of Fredericksburg. Enchanted Rock itself covers approximately 640 acres and rises 425 feet above the surrounding terrain to an elevation of 1,825 feet above sea level. It is the largest such pink granite monadnock in the United States. Hiking opportunities include the Loop Trail (our 5 mi. **“featured” trail**), Walnut Springs Overlook Trail (2 mi. **“alternate” trail**), and of course the ever popular Summit Trail (1.5 mi. with a 425' elev. change). **For those of you non-hikers, there are plenty of shady picnic tables along Sandy Creek.** As usual we will conclude the day with a fashionably late lunch in a popular Fredericksburg eatery.

We're doing things a bit differently this year in an effort to outsmart the weather gurus and not have to cancel and reschedule so many of our trips. If you're interested in joining us and have **not** been on a previous Genesis 1 trip, please call Gina in the church office (830-895-0100) and add your name, email address, and phone number to our list. If you have previously been on a Genesis 1 outing you should already be on our list. We'll be monitoring the extended weather forecasts from several sources, selecting a future date that has a high probability of good weather per a majority of the sources, and sending an email to everyone on our list 8-10 days prior to the departure date. Once you receive the email with the date notification, **notify Gina as soon as possible if you wish to sign up for that trip.** Because of conflicts on bus scheduling and a paucity of bus drivers, there will be some trips that we will need to take the church van instead (capacity of 10 plus the driver). Since **seating will be on a first come first served basis**, we would encourage you to call Gina as soon as possible to reserve your seat. We expect to see a lot of returning hikers this spring plus some new faces. We hope you'll try our merry little fellowship, and as always.....
