The passing of Billy Graham on February 21st, had most of us in a sad/joyful mood. Yes, we will miss him but the vision of him being met at heavens door by the millions of saints there due to his preaching the message of Christ brought many emotional tears. His sister Jean Ford said in her eulogy "everyone has a Billy Graham story", and I am no exception...

My Billy Graham Story

It was May 1952, the end of my first year at the University of Houston that I attended my first Billy Graham crusade. I immediately became a supporter, receiving his books and the Decision Magazine and listening, every chance I had, to the Hour of Decision on the radio. How thrilling it was to see the throngs of people respond to his message of salvation.

Later as a Pan American stewardess, the day of February 12, 1958 began as a routine flight from Panama to Mexico City, with stops in Costa Rica, Honduras and Guatemala. When we landed in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, the station manager came on board to tell us Billy Graham and his team would be flying with us to Guatemala. I was beyond excited! As I stood at the top of the stairs and watched Billy Graham, Cliff Barrows, George Bev Shea, Ted Smith, Grady Wilson and six other team members walk across the tarmac with the other passengers to board the plane, I knew this was no routine flight or ordinary day. When our plane landed in Guatemala and I opened the door of the plane, I saw hundreds of people there singing hymns in Spanish, eagerly waiting for Billy Graham and his team. Yes, it was not just a special day for me but a very blessed and memorable one!—But that's not the end of my story. The following year in March of 1959, I again had all of the Billy Graham team on a flight from Honolulu to Sydney, Australia. This long night flight gave me a chance to visit, ask questions and pray with these dedicated, humble and extraordinary servants of the Lord. How grateful I have felt all these years to have this wonderful experience, and I do thank the Lord for putting me at those places at those times.

Our WOW ladies had a busy March and are now looking forward to April (and hopefully some showers). love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so
rich a crown?

Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were
a present far too small; Love so amazing, so
divine, demands my soul, my life, my all."

We have news from Jerry Cobb that his surgery went well. They took out a third of Jerry's stomach. He will be facing recovery for some time.


Beth Marshall had eye surgery. Keep Beth on your prayers list as she has ongoing eye problems.


Gene Ayers and Janice Smith have finished their chemo treatments.
